SUMMARY

The City's comprehensive plan is being updated. As part of this update the City is required to demonstrate that it has sufficient land zoned to accommodate the City's projected population and employment growth over the next 20 years. The City must also show that it can accommodate a range of housing types and densities and that sufficient land has been allocated for the public services needed to support the projected growth.

In order to address these requirements, and identify changes necessary to accommodate the City's projected population and employment growth, the Planning Department worked with Skagit County GIS Services to conduct a computerized review of the City's urban growth area using zoning information and data from the Skagit County Auditor's office. The results of this study show that Burlington can accommodate its projected population growth, but must make changes to accommodate the projected growth in employment. Other changes should also be made to ensure the supply of housing is consistent with the City's economic and demographic characteristics and to ensure better coordination between land use and capital facilities plans.

RECOMMENDATION

Accept the Planning Commission's recommendation (Exhibit "A") and direct the Planning Department to develop more specific policy and regulatory changes based on the findings and recommendations outlined in the staff report prepared by the Planning Department (Exhibit "B").

SUMMARY

The City's Comprehensive Plan is being updated. The Washington State Growth Management Act (GMA) requires local governments to regulate development in hazardous or environmentally sensitive areas. These areas are known as "critical areas". Critical areas include wetlands, critical aquifer recharge areas, fish and wildlife habitat, floodplains, and geologic hazards.

In developing policies and regulations for the protection of critical areas the City must use valid and up-to-date scientific information. The GMA refers to such information as "best available science" (BAS). The City is also required to ensure its policies and regulations give "special consideration" to the protection and conservation of anadromous fish species, principally salmon and steelhead. The City's current critical area regulations were adopted in 2002. At that time the City elected to adopt a slightly modified version of Skagit County's critical areas code. Unfortunately, during the adoption process the City did not include references to BAS. Subsequent court decisions and Growth Management Hearings Board (GMHB) cases have held that local governments have an independent duty to include BAS in the adoption of critical area regulations.

To address the lack of BAS in the City's record, the City's Planning Department compiled BAS for each of the five critical areas identified by the GMA and compared this information to the City's current critical area regulations. The Planning Department's findings are documented in a report dated July 13, 2018. The Planning Commission has reviewed this work and recommends the City move forward with the proposed changes identified in the Planning Department's report.

RECOMMENDATION

Accept the Planning Commission's recommendation (Exhibit "A") and direct the Planning Department to develop more specific policy and regulatory changes based on the findings and recommendations outlined in the critical areas report prepared by the Planning Department (Exhibit "B").

SUMMARY

BPD has approximately 30 portable radios dedicated to patrols, detectives and administration. We have approximately 4 radios dedicated to our Citizens on Patrol unit. Our current inventory is aged to the point where these portable radios are no longer supported by the manufacture. We have used them beyond the shelf life. I am pleased that through officer care, our radios have lasted as long as they have.

I have created a multi-year replacement plan for portable radios and in-car radios. This request is the first wave replacing 9 portable radios. I had estimated \$20k in 2018 to accomplish this and unfortunately underestimated the true cost by \$5k. The \$5k will be absorbed through other current budget categories.

RECOMMENDATION

Allow the expenditure of \$25,245.26 for the purchase of 9 portable radios. This quote was obtained through the State bid list.
