SUMMARY

City staff is recommending a change to the structure of billing for the sanitary sewer system. Currently, sewer fees are adopted by ordinance. As Council is likely aware, rates have remained unchanged since 2010, and have fallen behind the actual costs the City incurs to operate the sanitary sewer system. City staff is proposing a change so that the ordinance directs that specific fees for sanitary sewer are adopted by resolution. Adopting fees by resolution makes it more efficient for staff to be able to propose changes to rates when needed, without the time consuming and costly process of altering the municipal code. As Council may recall, most City fees are now adopted by resolution and incorporated into a master list, in order to make it easier for citizens to determine what fees the City charges for various services.

Additionally, City staff is proposing two specific changes to the fees. First, beginning in 2019 and ending in 2023, staff proposes an automatic 3% annual increase of fees based on the ongoing increasing costs associated with capital expenses. In addition, for years 2019 and 2020, staff proposes an additional 2% increase to account for rising inflation. In years 2021-23, staff proposes an increase on top of the base 3% to be tied to the consumer price index, whatever that may be, from zero to a maximum of 2%. In other words, an increase of no less than 3%, but no more than 5%, in those years. Further adjustments may only be made by City Council.

For example, a single family home with two occupants currently pays a base monthly fee of \$30.56. If Council passes this resolution, the rate change for the first three years will change to \$32.09 in 2019, \$33.69 in 2020, then somewhere between \$34.70 - \$35.37 in 2021. Years 2022 and 2023 are more difficult to calculate based on the unknown change to CPI. No increases beyond 2023 are authorized without further Council action.

The second proposed change is to charge vehicles delivering wastewater to the sanitary sewer system an annual license fee of \$50.00.

All three of these items should be adopted at the same time, if Council so chooses.

SUMMARY

The 300 General Capital Reserve Fund provides funding for Capital & Facility Improvement Projects. This budget amendment is needed to properly account for the recently awarded FEMA grant of \$94,120 for procurement and installation of an exhaust extraction system. The amount for City match funding is \$21,223. Following this budget amendment is the request to award the bid for this facility improvement project.

Last year, the Fire Department was awarded a FEMA grant in the amount of \$94,120 for procurement and installation of an exhaust extraction system. Engineering staff requested proposals to design and install a vehicle exhaust system capable of servicing five of the apparatus bays. Bids were opened on December 14th, 2018. The lowest responsive bid from Benz Air Engineering Company is for \$115,343.

SUMMARY

Wastewater pump station #4 located at 331 South Section Street was constructed in 1975 and has been identified for upgrade within the City of Burlington Wastewater Comprehensive Plan. City Council awarded the design contract in March of 2018.

Eight bids were received on January 10, 2019. The lowest, responsive bid was received from Interwest Construction (ICI) of Burlington, WA. Staff recommends award to Interwest Construction (ICI) for the amount of \$943,244.75.

SUMMARY

Last year, the Fire Department received a FEMA grant for procurement of an exhaust extraction system. The exhaust system starts automatically when an engine in the apparatus bays is started. This system will capture and extract 100% of the exhaust fumes so there is no chance of exhaust fumes contaminating the air in the fire station.

Following the grant award, Engineering staff requested proposals to design and install a vehicle exhaust system capable of servicing five of the apparatus bays. Bids were opened on December 14th, 2018. The lowest responsive bid from Benz Air Engineering Company is for \$115,343. The FEMA grant will cover \$94,120.

Motion to approve the bid and award the contract for procurement to Benz Air Engineering Company for the exhaust extraction system and authorize the Mayor's signature on applicable documents.

SUMMARY

The replacement of City of Burlington patrol vehicles is a significant expenditure and investment. In early 2018 BPD spent considerable time analyzing our vehicle fleet to include the number and type of vehicles, replacement schedule and necessary equipment to be installed and/or replaced. This process allowed us to update our replacement schedule which ultimately saved taxpayer money as we replaced 1 less vehicle than what was originally scheduled. We also determined that the Ford Police Interceptor Utility met our needs which also save additional taxpayer money.

Conducting this analysis in 2018 delayed our vehicle order until April which further delayed the equipping of vehicles. Our patrol vehicles were not put into patrol service until October 2018; 7 months from the date of order.

Wanting to avoid a similar delay in 2019 we need to purchase and place our order in January. The unfortunate part of this is that Ford is changing their Police Interceptor Utility design so they have stopped taking orders for the 2019 model. As Ford changes production to the 2020 model year we will face delivery delays estimated to be sometime after July. The number of orders, order in which orders are received and production will impact the delivery date.

RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the purchase of two (2) Ford Police Interceptor Utility vehicles as outlined in the quote provided in the amount of \$77,349.90.

SUMMARY

David Hansen Credit Trust owns both parcels (P71452 & P71458) abutting the dead end of Hazel Avenue west of North Oak Street to the BNSF Railroad right of way and is proposing to vacate the west 91 feet of the street adjacent to these lots.
