HISTORY AND SUMMARY

The State Legislature recently approved SHB 1406, which creates a revenue sharing program for local governments to use tax credited against the state sales tax for housing investments. The revenue may be used for acquiring, rehabilitating or constructing affordable housing; operations and maintenance of new affordable or supportive housing facilities, or, for Cities the size of Burlington, rental assistance.

It is noteworthy that if Council were to adopt the provisions of SHB 1406, no new tax would be imposed. The revenue would simply be directed to the City, rather than to the State. In other words: local jurisdictions retain a portion of the sales and use taxes already paid.

If the attached resolution of *intent* is passed, the City will then need to pass an ordinance formally adopting this legislation on or before July 27, 2020.

Skagit County has passed a similar resolution already. It is likely that the County and Cities of Skagit County will evaluate a cooperative plan to pool resources under SHB 1406, which is allowed under the statute. Those pooled resources could allow for larger projects than any one City could accomplish on its own. DOR has estimated a maximum of approximately \$74,000 in City revenue and approximately \$466,000 in revenue across the County, depending on several factors. The revenue is bondable, and limited to a maximum of 20 years.

The tax credit to the City would likely be 0.0073% at this time. Cities with qualifying local taxes may receive up to 0.0146%. A qualifying local tax is one that addresses housing, chemical dependency or mental health, among a few other closely related topics. Staff is only aware of around 10 cities in the State that have such a tax. Burlington does not have such a qualifying local tax at this time; thus, the lower percentage applies.

If the City were interested in passing such a qualifying local tax, that would need to occur on or before July 31, 2020. If Council desires such a proposal, work would need to begin on that soon, in order to meet that deadline. Such a tax would almost certainly require voter approval, so inclusion on one of the normal ballots before July 2020 would be desirable.

ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED

The City is not required to pass the resolution of intent now or in the future. Taking no action means that the City will not directly receive funds under this resolution. That may result in the City's portion being directed to the County. There is time to consider the adoption of this Resolution – it must be passed on or before January 28, 2020 to be effective. Therefore, if Council has further questions, this item may be continued to a future Council date.

CURRENT AND FUTURE BUDGET RAMIFICATIONS

The City would receive funding that may be used for the specific items as identified under SHB 1406. It is likely that a cooperative proposal between the County and local Cities will be presented to Council for consideration, once such a plan is drafted.

LEGAL ASPECTS – LEGAL REVIEW

The City is authorized to pass the attached resolution. There is no legal requirement to do so, however. If the City desires to pass the resolution, it must comply with the deadlines outlined in this agenda item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Pass the attached resolution and direct staff to begin work on a plan for the anticipated revenue.

HISTORY AND SUMMARY

The City of Burlington is now responsible for enhanced EMS services, as administered through the Fire Department, with support from the City Attorney, finance and other City departments. As part of that change, the City now has a heightened exposure to protected health information ("PHI"). Under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA"), it is possible to establish the City as a "Hybrid Entity", whereby only those departments of the City that handle PHI are required to meet the heightened administrative requirements, or "covered functions" of HIPAA. Although the City has handled PHI before the EMS service enhancement, it is advisable to reestablish which departments are performing covered functions under HIPAA, and therefore require training, certifications or other necessary steps. The other, non-covered, City departments would still generally be required to comply with HIPAA, but would not be subject to the heightened requirements of the covered departments.

ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED

It is not necessary to establish the City as a hybrid entity. However, if the City does not do so, it will be necessary to provide HIPAA training and support to all departments as though they are performing covered functions under HIPAA. There will be added expense and time commitments in order to do so.

CURRENT AND FUTURE BUDGET RAMIFICATIONS

Proper HIPAA training and support for departments that perform covered functions is necessary already, and there are associated costs. Passage of this resolution will help to limit costs by excluding those departments that do not perform covered functions.

LEGAL ASPECTS – LEGAL REVIEW

The City Attorney's office recommends this action from both liability and risk management perspectives.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of this resolution. The hybrid entity designation exists precisely for entities like Burlington that perform other functions beyond healthcare; there is no reasonable basis staff is aware of for not adopting the Resolution.

SUGGESTED COUNCIL MOTION LANGUAGE
